Firstly, remember that as a church we exist to work for supernatural change. Humans today are as spiritually dead as they ever were. We still proclaim the gospel to the graveyard, and only God can raise people from the dead.

Secondly, remember that persecution is normal for Christians and Jesus promised that his followers would be persecuted by the world. And though in the West we do not as yet face violent physical opposition, we do 'share Christ's suffering', being insulted for the name of Christ: not because of our creedal confessions, but because of our moral convictions on human sexuality, and the sanctity of life and marriage. But take heart. Jesus promised that if we stand firm, we shall win life (Luke 21:19). And the fires of persecution are more likely to forge resolve rather than resignation.

And thirdly, we should eschew utopianism. Though we pray that God's Kingdom might come and his will be done on earth as in heaven, we are just as confident that is a work that God himself will accomplish. In obedience and in response to God's grace, we do justice, and we love mercy, but ultimately we walk humbly with our God, who himself will usher in the New Heavens and the New Earth.

As for you, keep your head in all situations, endure hardship, do the work of an evangelist, and discharge all the duties of your ministry. [2 Timothy 4:5]

God of our ancestors, whose chosen servant Abraham was given faith to obey your call and go out into the unknown: endow your church with such faith that we may follow you with courage; for the sake of Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen

Hope and Evangelism in a Brave New World

In 1st Century Rome, Christians were commonly thought to be not simply wrong, but wrong-headed: atheists and enemies of the state, the cause of all that was wrong in the world and the objects of ridicule and derision. In 21st Australia the parallels are increasingly evident. We are often seen as moral outlaws and are ridiculed and derided for holding 'bigoted', hypocritical, and 'hateful' understandings of ethics and morality.

The temptation I guess is to either retreat into enclaves and so cease to be salt and light in the public square, or to become militant and aggressive, and so cease to be wise as serpents and as innocent as doves. Either way, we act as if God has forfeited his divine rule over our nation, and we take control where we think God has lost control.

But there is a better way to live in what seems like an increasingly alien context. And there is still good news to be proclaimed, to a world that needs the gospel, no less now than it did in the 1st Century. To that end I offer the following encouragement as we seek to evangelise a post Christian culture.
