 - (b) How do these promises relate to the promises made to Abraham (Gen12:1-3)
- 3. How can God's promises be fulfilled?
 - (a) What must the people do?
 - (b) Is this possible?
- 4. Group the commandments into different categories
 - (a) Why do they begin as they do in V1-3?
 - (b) How does God's law reveal
 - i. Our sin
 - ii. Our saviour
 - iii. God's standards

- 9. What implication does this have for
 - (a) Our understanding of Jesus?
 - (b) Our relationship with Jesus?
