A FRESH LOOK AT STEWARDSHIP

I've been to enough funerals to know there is truth in the old saying 'you can't take it with you'. However, that has often made me wonder whether we would be even less generous throughout this life if we were able to take it with us. The fact that we can't should not be our motivation for being generous, but instead the fact that it all comes from God in the first place. Our generosity should come from our hearts, not our circumstances.

The scriptures are filled with teachings about the foolish and wise ways in which we can spend what God has given us. From the widow's offering of her two small copper coins (Luke 21:1-4) to the parable of the Rich Fool (Luke 12:13-21). When the rich man in Jesus' parable was blessed was 'an abundant harvest', he was faced with a choice. What to do with his abundance? He chose to 'Take life easy; eat, drink and be merry.' Many of his neighbours, then and now, might have agreed with him and thought that this was a wise choice. This seems to be our default cultural response in Australia as well, as we're encouraged to either accumulate wealth or to spend it on a 'good retirement'. As Christians who listen to and follow Jesus however, we need to see life from God's perspective, not the world's. In the parable God called the man a fool because he stored things up for himself but was not 'rich toward God'.

When we meet God face to face, how would you answer him if he asked you, 'I've given you so much so you could love me and love your neighbour, so how did you use what I entrusted into your care?' The answer we give will depend on where our heart is.

Jesus said in Matthew 6:19-24 that we should not store up for ourselves treasures on earth, but instead we should store up for ourselves treasures in heaven. He said, 'For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also'. He finishes that thought by warning us that we cannot serve both God and money. This is why Jesus praised the widow for her sacrificial giving.

THE PRAYER BOOK-OUR PRAYER BOOK

Before the 1549 Prayer book.

Henry the eighth broke away from Rome at an administrative level, but the services of worship, theology and internal administration remained much the same. Yet, Henry was happy for his son Edward, to be educated in Europe at the feet of the Reformers. It appears obvious to me, that when Edward became king, things would change dramatically, and they did!


It would seem that Cranmer had been working on the concept of a common prayer book for a while, and maybe the timing was right to get sanction to go ahead from Edward, soon after his coronation. I am guessing (because I am hopeless at the machinations of politics) that Edward would also have a sense of urgency with Mary snapping at his toes! She, guite rightly, saw this common prayer book as preparing the English Church to join with the national churches of the continent and become a truly reformed church, with the one difference the change came from the top down, where as in Europe the change came from the people, ie, bottom – upwards. For the Anglican church this has always been either a blessing or a curse depending on circumstances.

So, what was in this book?

A basic lectionary, morning and evening prayer and Introits, collects, epistles and Gospels for the year. These were gleaned from a wide variety of sources, some of which were reforming Roman Catholic theologians.

Then, "The Supper of the Lord, and Holy Communion commonly called The Masse." (Which was a thinly veiled version of the (Roman)Sarem Rite.)

There was Baptism order – public and private; Confirmation and a catechism. A marriage service, Visitation of the sick with Holy Communion. Burial. Purification of Women. Prayers for Ash Wednesday.



These services were followed by an explanation of 'Ceremonies omitted', and why they were. Cranmer removed anything he saw as contrary to Scripture and as the Epistle and Gospel were now read in English this was a very adept move. Also, anything that smacked of sacrificial offerings was removed. The Jewish regimen of prayer seven times a day was refined to, to what later became, 'Morning and Evening Prayer'. There was no ordinal.

Whatever else may be said of the 1549 book, it appears to be a first step, and a very big step, away from being just a resource book for priests (who at this point in time used a number of sources to create a service, and express their personal theology). It was a first attempt to put a book of 'Common' prayer in common people's hands to clearly define doctrine, worship and a systematic readina of the scriptures. Unfortunately, today, this idea appears to be in reverse, moving back to just being a resource for the priest.

STARTING FRESH AT SCHOOL

At the end of December, Christmas was over. This meant two things at the shops: 1. Hot cross buns go on sale - yum! 2. The 'back to school' sales begin the reminder to children that school will start soon.

The prospect of school starting bring different emotions. For some it is a great joy as school is fun and we have friends. For some is the time for big school to start, they get to use their new drink bottle, bag, shoes and uniform. For some parents it is a relief for life to return to normal.

We remember our great God, we remind each other of his character, his strength, his limitless understanding. His ability to strengthen us for whatever 2021 has in store.

Remind yourself of what he did in 2020. He led us, sustained us, he never became faint or weary. At no point was he asleep. He knew all that would happen in 2020, it was all in his complete control.

Ingredients

- 2 cups of oats
- 1/4 cup coconut

- Maple syrup to drizzle

Hello everyone and welcome to 2021.

Here is a recipe which has been a morning lifesaver in our house. I bake this in the evening and the kids have it at breakfast warmed in the microwave. It can even be cut into slices and go in the lunchbox as a nutrient dense snack. It comes from https://therootcause.com.au/french-porridge-pie/ I use a blender instead of mashing the bananas, as one of my kids doesn't exactly like them. ©

FRENCH PORRIDGE PIE

Method

- 1. Pre-heat oven to 180 degrees.
- 2. Place oats into a square dish
- 3. Add coconut and chia seeds and mix around with your hands.
- 4. Add the cooled melted butter, bananas, rice syrup, cinnamon, milk, vanilla and eggs to a blender and blitz till the mix is smooth.
- 5. Pour over the oats and use a spoon to push the oats around to make sure they are all wet.
- 6. Place the halved strawberries over the top, then sprinkle with the pepitas and drizzle lightly with maple syrup.
- 7. Bake in oven for 30-35 minutes until golden.
- 8. Take out and allow to rest for 10 minutes before serving warm.

Allow the pie to cool completely before cutting into bars or slices for the lunchbox (it's easier when it's cooled) Enjoy.♥

So how do we start well at school in 2021. Here are eight tips:

1. Remind your children and yourselves that school is good for children. Encourage your children to enjoy their time at school, no matter how hard or easy they find the school work.

2. Know that Thank God for school – no matter how we feel about school.

3. Put creative reminders that God is with us at school (Bible verses in lunch boxes).

4. Pray about school each day.

5. Try listening to a psalm on the drive to school (the Bible gateway app, plays audio). There are around 200 school days each year and 150 psalms.

6. Celebrate God sustaining us at school – perhaps a milkshake after first day or week at school and a prayer.

7. Each family member could draw a picture about how they are feeling about school starting. Tuck the picture away and bring it out at a later time (not when the child is tired) and review how God's strength sustained us.

8. Remember the Apostle Paul's words in 2Corinthians 5: We are Christ's ambassadors; God is making his appeal through us. We speak for Christ when we plead, "Come back to God!" For God made Christ, who never sinned, to be the offering for our sin, so that we could be made right with God through Christ.

We are his ambassadors wherever we are, including school as kids, parents and teachers.

The Queensland Government continues to remind us that, whilst COVID-19 is currently under control in Queensland, now is not the time to become complacent in our practice and management of this virus. With this in mind, and with the beginning of a new year, it is time for us to have a fresh look at being a COVIDSafe church.

What is covered by our Industry Plan? Our normal church services are covered by the industry plan. This includes baptisms and confirmations. What does this mean for us in practice in Central Queensland?

- All churches are now working to person capacity ratio of 1 person per 2sqm. We must also continue to allow for 1.5m between non-related/household seating.
- Contract tracing must be done for all services and activities even if it is only regulars who attend.
- All hygiene practices including ministry practices and the preparation and distribution of communion remain unchanged from 2020.
- Gloves should be worn when counting offertory and if possible try and encourage each other to give electronically.
- Churches need to be "light cleaned" with sanitising of high touch areas between services and "COVID cleaned" at the end of each day (unchanged from 2020).
- Wearing of masks remains voluntary in the CQ region at the time of writing.

What is not covered by our industry plan? Weddings and Funerals, Food service, Op Shops, Playgroups, Youth Groups, Fetes, Trivia nights, Garden Parties etc. What does this mean in practice in Central Queensland?

- Funerals in a church complying with COVID Industry plan may now have up to 200 people attend regardless of the size of the building.
- Weddings in a church complying with COVID Industry plan may now have up to 200 people attend regardless of the size of the building. For weddings seating should allow for 1.5m between attenders where possible.
- All other activities not covered by the Endorsed industry plan require an approved Risk Assessment and COVID plan (and event checklist where appropriate).

What needs a Risk Assessment, COVID Plan, & COVID event Checklist? Anything not covered by our endorsed industry plan.

Do risk assessments and COVID Plans need to be submitted to the Diocese for approval? Yes.

Advice from the Health Department is that these requirements will remain in place unless a local outbreak occurs or herd immunity is achieved.

Jesus commanded us to love our neighbour as ourselves (Mark 12:31); doing all we can to help keep this virus at bay is one practical way in which we can love our neighbour.
